APOSTROPHE REMINDER

To show that someone owns something when you are talking about one person or object, you use an apostrophe before the 's': Victor stole Kayla's football.

To show that someone owns something when you are talking about more than one person or object, you use an apostrophe after the 's': Kayla ran over the boys' coats.
